Forward From Phil Trammell

Hello and welcome to our inaugural **Nonprofit Nexus: State of the Sector** report. As with any first attempt, we know we'll learn from this and improve as we work to inform our community of the impact nonprofit organizations have on all our daily lives. We are extraordinarily grateful to our sponsors who believed in us and joined us in this critical work. We could not do this without them.

While we can only report the results from the responses we received, the response rate was excellent. We believe the results are a fair representation of the nearly 5000 nonprofits that serve our 17 county, three state region and we learned some important things.

- Nonprofits provided 250,000 instances of service. With a regional population of approximately 1.2 million, that's an indication that we or our neighbors are directly served by a nonprofit. We know that nonprofits help the unsheltered, the hungry or the indigent, but we often overlook that our nonprofits bring educational programming, parks and trails, theaters, museums, festivals, youth sports and performances, and many quality of life programs to our community.
- These nonprofits relied on volunteers to assist them in meeting their mission, to the tune of nearly 325,000 hours of time and effort, valued at more than \$10,000,000 in donated time. If time is the single most valuable thing any of us have, then that's a very generous gift being made in support of nonprofits. I imagine that number includes many of you!
- Despite the persistent belief that our nonprofits don't collaborate with each other, the results suggest that in fact, there are a wide variety of collaborations that expand the communities reached and amplify the impact of the resources invested.
- These nonprofits contribute more than \$225,000,000 to the economy, purchasing goods and services and employing thousands all while filling the gaps in services in our communities that would likely be ignored were it not for their work.

The Nonprofit Resource Center is proud to present this work and will be responsive to our community in constantly improving it. It is our core mission to improve nonprofits, to raise the level of professionalism, competence, and impact of our sector. Data will always inform those efforts. Thank you for being an important part of that effort. Don't ever doubt that it matters.

Background

The Nonprofit Resource Center (NRC) is committed to serving communities in a tri-state, 17-county region by supporting and helping to strengthen nonprofits that serve communities in the region. As part of this commitment, NRC partnered with the Ochs Center to conduct a survey with nonprofits in the region to better understand the current state of nonprofits and their economic impact.

The 17-county region spans southeast Tennessee, northwest Georgia, and northeast Alabama and is anchored by Hamilton County, TN. It includes a mix of urban, suburban, and rural counties with distinct geographic features: the Cumberland Plateau, Sequatchie Valley, and Tennessee River corridor, along with the forested mountains of southeast Tennessee and north Georgia.

The region reflects a contrast between a growing metropolitan core in the Chattanooga area and smaller rural counties. Population size ranges from about 13,000 in the smallest rural counties to approximately 370,000 in Hamilton County for a total population of over 1.2 million. Median household incomes vary widely. Hamilton and suburban counties trend toward \$60,000 to \$70,000, while rural plateau and valley counties are lower, often in the mid-\$40k to low-\$50k range. Poverty rates are higher in the rural plateau counties.



Methodology

A web survey was designed to collect information from nonprofits about their mission, service area, funding streams, operating budget, and current challenges they and the community they serve are facing.

An email invitation with a link to the survey was sent by NRC's Executive Director on June 5, 2025, to 340 nonprofits in the region. Two additional reminders were sent. The invitation was also shared widely by United Way of Greater Chattanooga, Generosity Trust, and Community Foundation of the Greater Ocoee Region.

The survey was anonymous, and completion time was approximately 20 minutes. Those who completed the survey were allowed to skip questions without a response. The survey link was opened 176 times with varying degrees of completion. The last response was received on July 21, 2025. Data from 113 organizations – 50 who fully completed the survey and 63 who completed more than half - are included in the analysis for this report.

Secondary data accessed from ArcGIS developed by Esri (Environmental Systems Research Institute) was used to create Community Profiles and Nonprofit Charitable Profile for each county in the region provided in the Appendix to this report. The volunteer behavior and market potential indices are based on data collected and curated by MRI Simmons. Higher numbers for both indices indicate individuals in the geography are more likely to engage in the specific behaviors listed.



Service Area

The reach of nonprofits participating in the survey extends throughout the 17-county region.

- Almost half of the nonprofits serve more than one county – many serving more than 10 counties.
- DeKalb County, Alabama, is served by the fewest number of nonprofits while Hamilton County, Tennessee, is served by the highest number.
- The 55 nonprofits serving in only one county have their home offices in either Bradley County, Tennessee, Catoosa County, Georgia, Marion County, Tennessee, or Hamilton County and only provide local services.

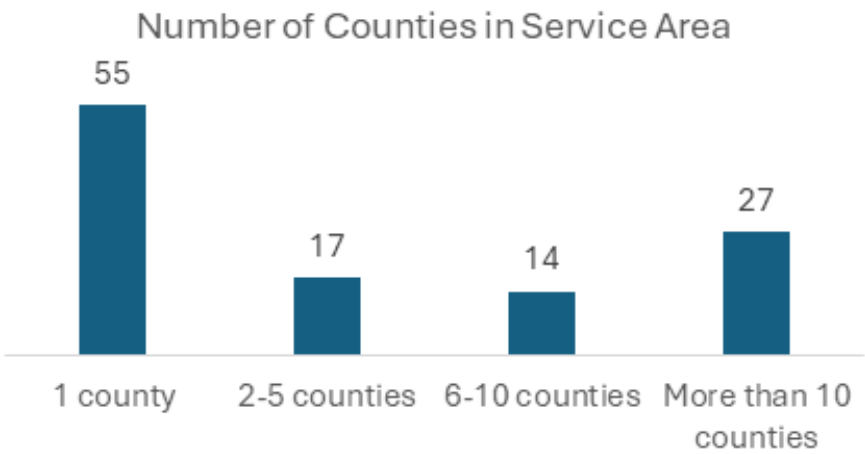


Figure 1: Number of counties in service area (n=113)

Service Sectors

Like trends of serving in multiple counties, many nonprofits provide services from more than one of five service sectors—Arts and Culture, Community and Economic Development, Education, Faith Based Initiatives, Health and Well-being, and Human and Social Services.

- Services offered by nonprofits frequently span across several service sectors.
- The focus of most nonprofits completing the survey are Human and Social Services, Education, and Health and Well-Being.
- Youth development, housing security, and mental health services are specific services that are most commonly provided.

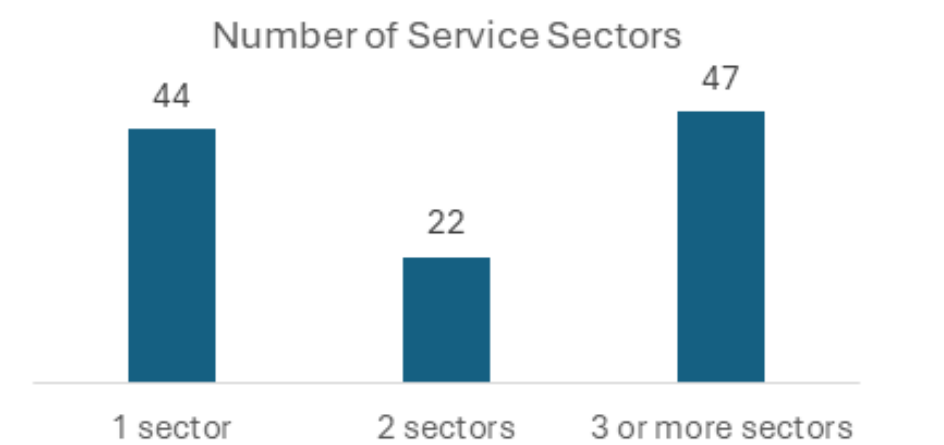


Figure 2: Service sectors (n=113)

Impacts

Nonprofits have an impact on the overall well-being of communities through revenue generation, job creation, expenditures that support the local economy, and providing community members an opportunity to serve others in the community.

Funding

Nonprofits in the region rely on diversified funding streams and reflect a wide range of funding levels. Agencies identified funding from ten types of funding sources. (See Table 3.)

- The average number of revenue streams is five with a range from one to all ten sources.
- Only five reported a single source of funding and listed the source as individual donor, donation, or fundraising event.
- Nonprofits providing their information generated almost \$300 million in revenue for the region.

Job Creation

Nonprofits provide employment opportunities in their communities and contribute to the local economy through employee's purchasing power. Nonprofits report a wide range of employment opportunities in their organization.

- More than half of those responding—57 of 90—had five or fewer part-time employees while 52 of 90 had ten or fewer full-time employees.
- The average number of part-time employees working in nonprofits in the region is 18 and the average number of full-time employees is 39.

- Annual salaries for the top position of 43 nonprofits —CEO, Executive Director, or President—range from \$12,000 to \$273,630 and average \$92,930.
- Annual salaries for 51 program directors and senior staff positions range from \$30,000 to \$110,000 and average \$68,075.
- Salaries and wages from nonprofits provide employees with almost \$1.2 million in purchasing power.

Expenditures Supporting Local Economy

Purchases related to program and administrative expenses also contribute to the overall local economy. Operating expenses—including the cost of services provided—exceed \$100 million that is paid into the local economy.

Current Challenges

Nonprofits face many challenges in their mission to serve the community.

- Achieving long term financial stability is the most common challenge facing nonprofits in the region. While there is great variation, the average time nonprofits can continue to operate without additional funding is 9 months.
- Lack of community awareness about the nonprofit, increase in demand for services without an increase in funding, and ability to provide competitive wages for employees are acknowledged challenges.

Financial stability can best be ensured if endowment funds are available and with the acquisition of non-cash assets such as real estate, mutual funds, or valued property such as artwork.

- Only 33 of 86 nonprofit organizations reporting have an endowment.
- However, 51 nonprofit organizations have non-cash assets that include real estate. Thirty (30) nonprofits own all of their spaces of operation and 12 own a portion of their operation space.

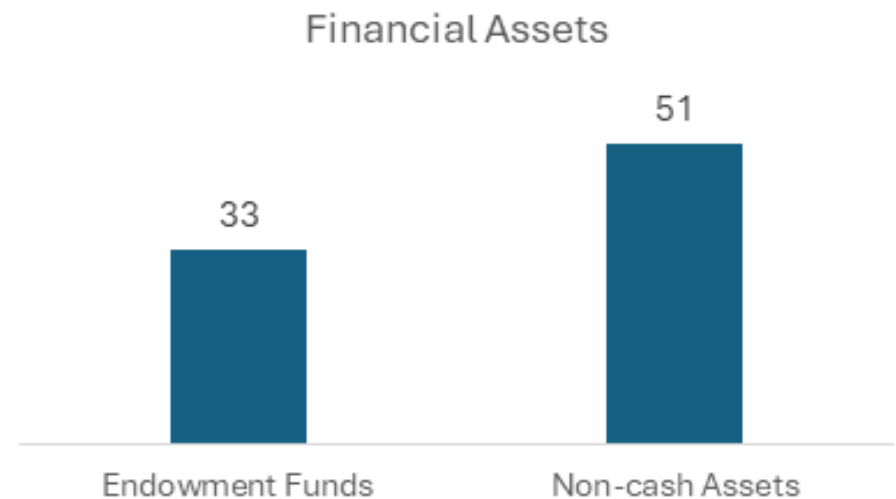
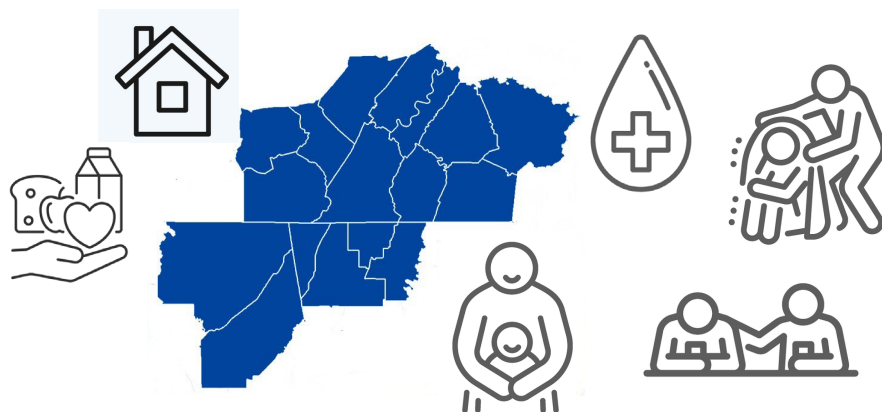


Figure 3: Financial assets (n=86)

Unmet Needs in the Region

The need for services provided by nonprofits continues to grow with 89 of 112 reporting that the demand for services has increased over the past fiscal year. When asked to select three most critical unmet needs in the community, supports for overall well-being—adequate housing, access to health care, and food security—are most frequently recognized. Moreover, resources that help promote self-sufficiency—access to transportation and childcare—are also identified as unmet needs.

- Lack of permanent affordable housing and mental health services are the most frequently identified critical unmet needs in the region.
- Housing needs and support that includes affordable housing, assistance for unhoused, rental assistance, and transitional housing, emerge as the top needs in the region (selected by 59 participants).
- Access to affordable health care, mental health services, substance use disorder treatment, and health education and prevention are also critical (selected by 56 participants).
- Food insecurity and lack of access to transportation are identified by one out of four as one of the most critical unmet needs.

Collaboration

Nonprofits frequently collaborate with other organizations in the region. Collaborative efforts can expand the service area and build opportunities to provide a wider breadth of services.

- Only three of 85 organizations report they do not collaborate with other organizations.
- Most organizations (43) partner with organizations whose services overlap with their own but also provide additional services.
- Fewer organizations (19) only collaborate with organizations that provide similar services.

Collaborations take on different forms and are unique for each working relationship.

- Informal partnerships were the most reported form of collaboration. These partnerships do not include a formal agreement but instead rely on regular communication to share resources and referrals.
- Many of the organizations participate in coalitions—regional, statewide, or national—whose mission is like their own.
- Few have formal or contractual agreements.

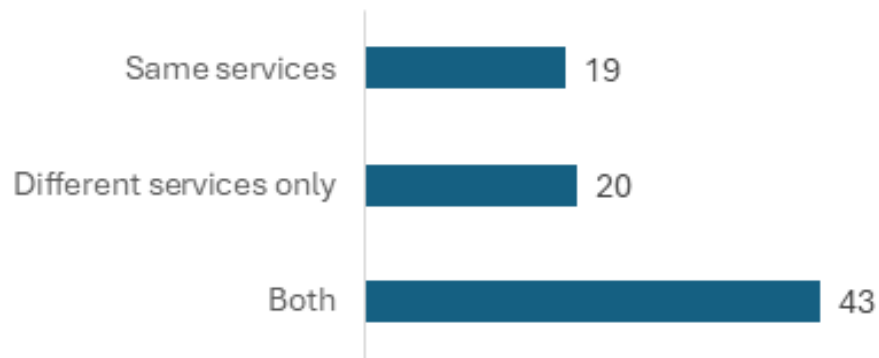


Figure 4: Collaboration with other organizations (n=110)

Consideration for Future Collaborations

Most nonprofits recognize the benefits of collaboration and would consider partnering with another organization in the future. Reasons that might encourage organizations to enter a partnership or collaboration are:

- to increase ability to provide targeted impact
- to increase cost effectiveness
- to facilitate improved coordination of services

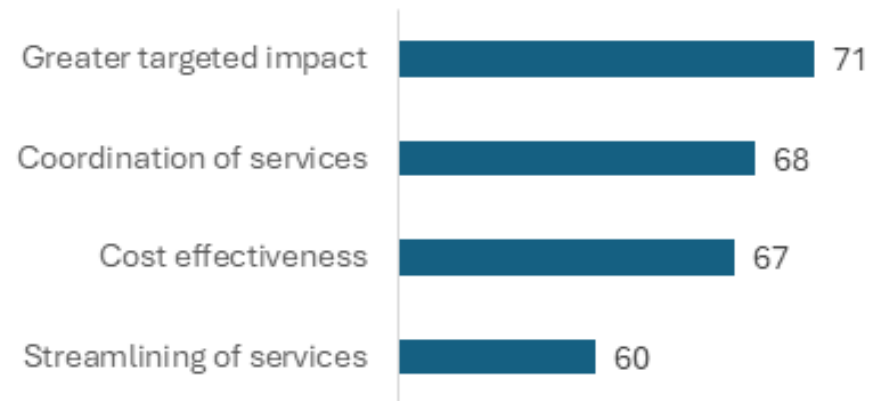


Figure 5: Benefits of collaboration (n=79) Number of nonprofits total more than sample size due to multiple responses being chosen.

Challenges for Building Collaborations

While potential benefits from partnering with other nonprofits are wide reaching, building collaborations does not come without its challenges.

- In a time when demand for services is increasing, building collaborations requires time and effort. Lack of staff capacity is the most frequently cited barrier for engaging in this effort.
- Nonprofits often struggle to maintain financial stability and competition for funding can also be seen as a barrier for building partnerships with other nonprofits.



Barriers to building collaborations

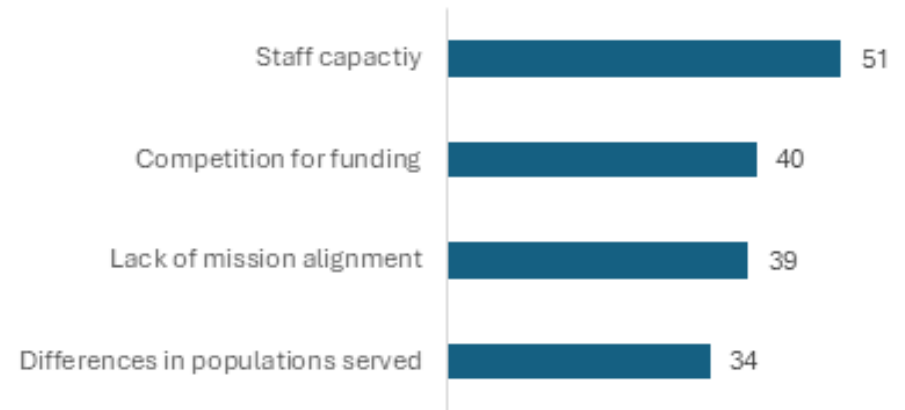


Figure 6: Barriers for building collaborations (n=79) Number of nonprofits total more than sample size due to multiple responses being chosen.

Conclusion

The results of this study highlight the essential role nonprofits play in the social and economic fabric of the tri-state, 17-county region. Nonprofits serve as a unifying thread connecting people, services, and opportunities across the region. They generate nearly \$300 million in revenue, employ thousands, and support the well-being of more than 250,000 individuals annually. Their presence ensures that critical services—from housing security to youth development—are available where gaps might otherwise remain.

At the same time, the study underscores the uneven distribution of nonprofit resources. Hamilton County benefits from the largest concentration of organizations, while smaller rural counties—where poverty rates are often higher and health outcomes poorer—are served by fewer nonprofits. This imbalance highlights both the importance of collaboration across county lines and the need for intentional investment in rural areas to ensure that vulnerable populations are not left behind.

Economically, nonprofits prove themselves to be more than service providers. With over \$116 million in payroll compensation, extensive employee benefits, and more than \$100 million in program and administrative expenditures, they function as an economic engine. Their purchasing power and expenditures stimulate local businesses, while the contributions of over 324,000 volunteer hours further expand the region's capacity for collective problem-solving.

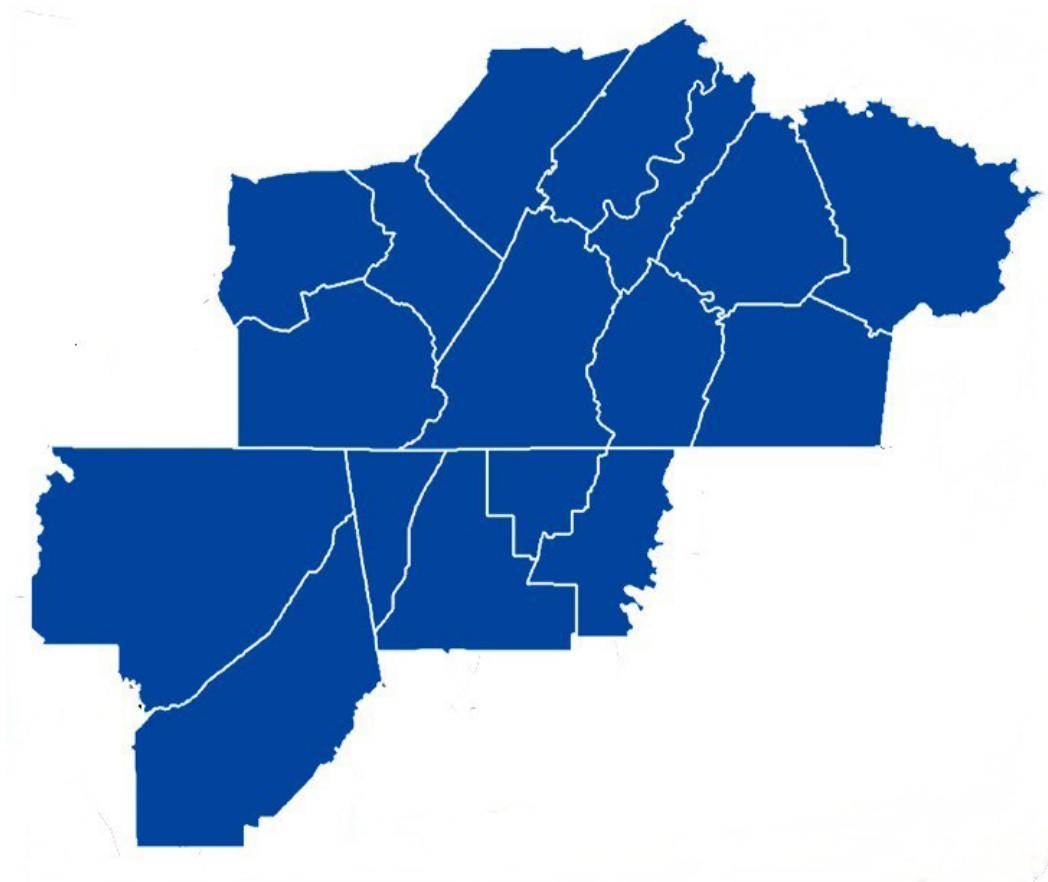
Yet challenges remain. Financial stability is the most persistent concern, with many organizations reporting they could sustain operations for less than a year without new funding. Nonprofits also face rising demand for services, limited public awareness, and difficulties offering competitive wages. These pressures underscore the need for diversified revenue strategies and policies that help nonprofits achieve greater stability.

Collaboration emerges as both a strength and a future opportunity. Most organizations already partner with others, whether informally, through coalitions, or via formal agreements. The willingness to expand collaborative efforts reflects a regional recognition that complex problems cannot be solved in isolation. At the same time, barriers such as staff capacity and competition for resources need to be addressed through intentional support and capacity-building efforts.

Taken together, the findings affirm the vital role of nonprofits in building stronger, more resilient communities across the region. Encouraging cross-county collaboration can leverage the full potential of its nonprofit sector. The Nonprofit Resource Center is uniquely positioned to champion these efforts—helping ensure that nonprofits not only fill critical gaps left by other sectors but also drive the region forward in equity, health, and economic vitality.



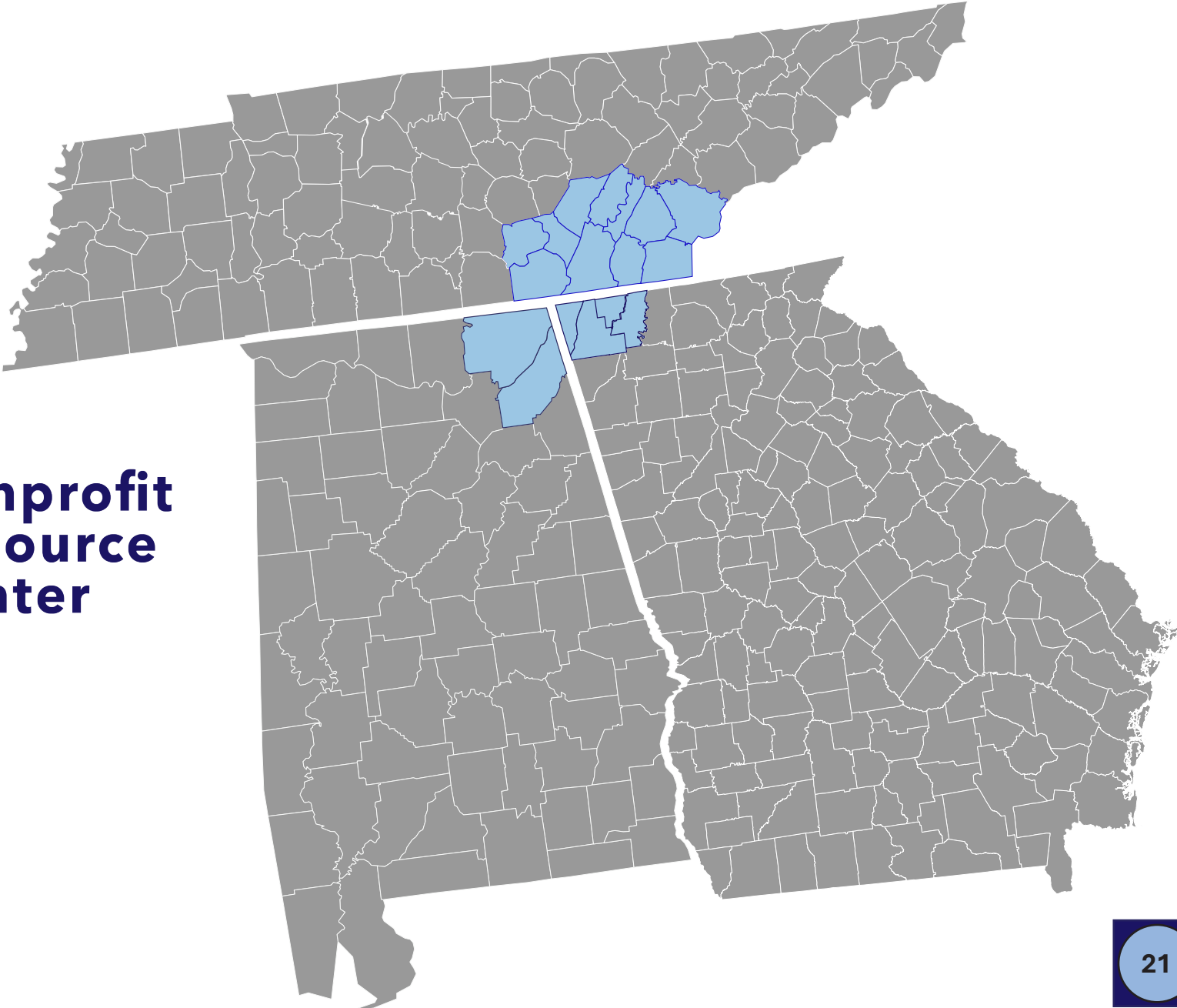
